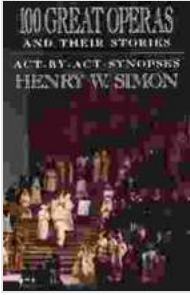

27. Elektra (Richard Strauss)

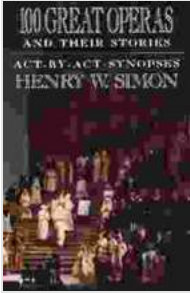

29. The Tales of Hoffmann (Jacques Offenbach)

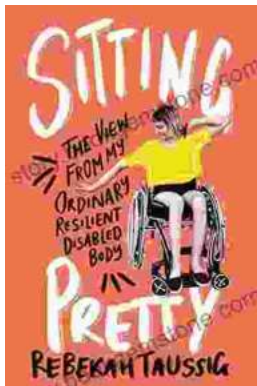
