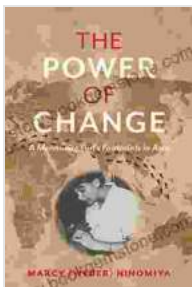


Mennonite Girl Footprints in Asia: A Journey of Service and Discovery
