



Mary Churchill



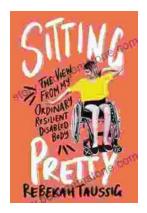

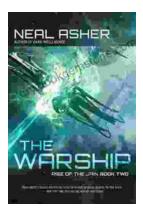
