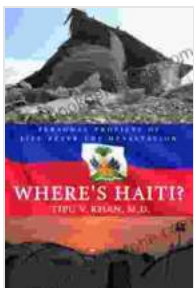


Where Haiti: Personal Profiles of Life After the Devastation

Jean-Robert Cadet



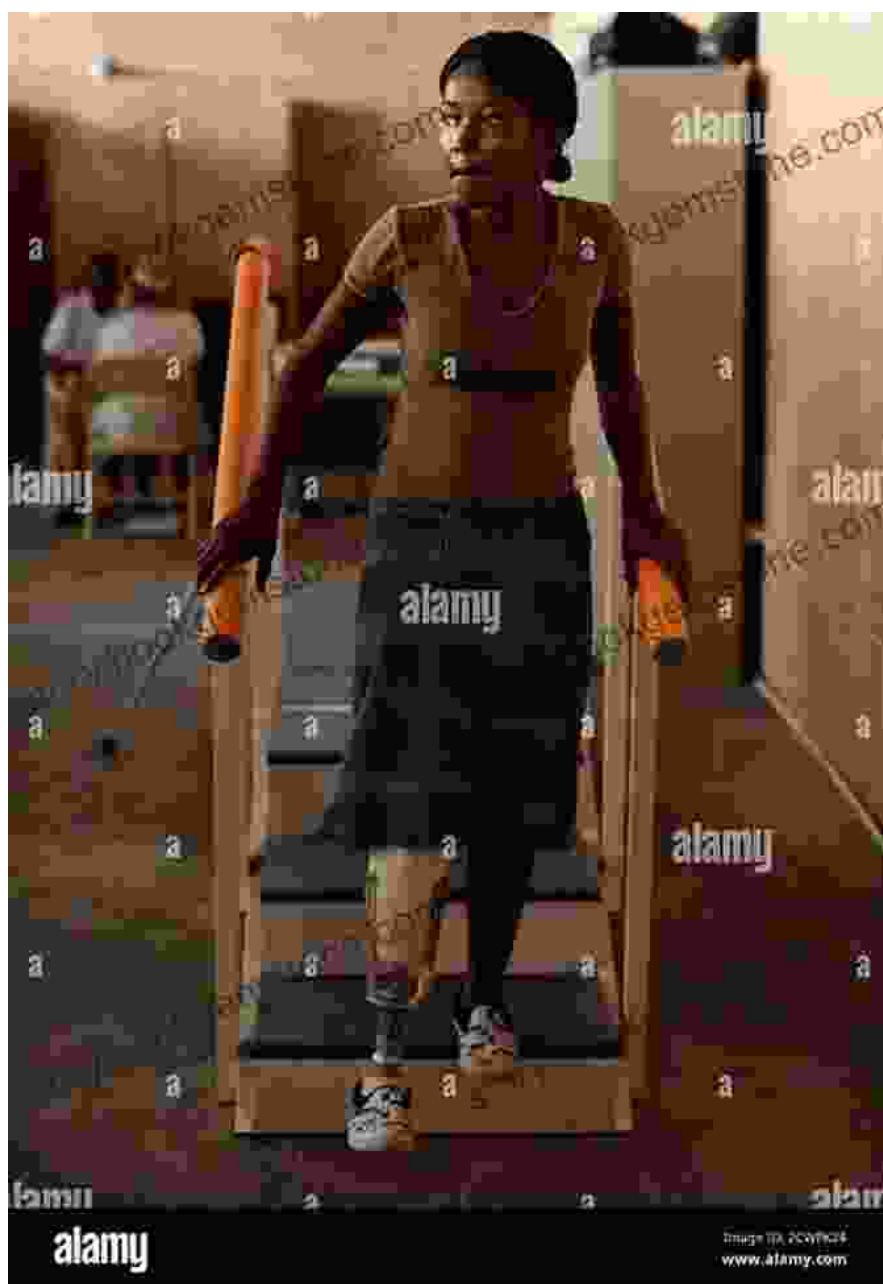

Grégory Saint-Hilaire

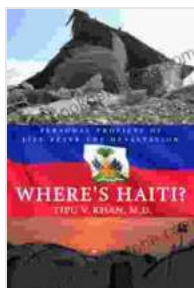


Grégory Saint-Hilaire was 28 years old when the earthquake struck Haiti. He was living in a small house in Port-au-Prince with his wife and two

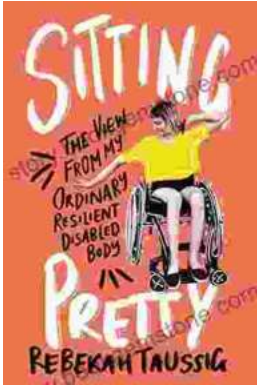
